


A REMINDER

Scratch is a website where you can create games, songs and more through coding and programming using algorithms.




What you can do?

There are numerous projects you can create on Scratch, the best thing about it is it doesn't matter what level you are! If you are a beginner or a professional, Scratch is useable for everyone.



How to create a project?

When you go onto the scratch, go to the top left-hand corner and press 'create'. Then you can insert characters, code blocks and bring your project come to life!



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about TIKTOK

TikTok is a video-sharing social media app which lets people create, view and download looping 15-second clips. Typically, these are videos of users lip-synching and dancing to popular songs or soundbites (often for comic purposes), enhanced with filters, effects and text. Designed with young people in mind, TikTok skyrocketed in popularity in 2020 and has featured near the top of download charts ever since. It now has around a billion users worldwide.

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Most videos appearing on a child's feed are light-hearted and amusing, however, some clips have been reported for including drug and alcohol abuse, violence, or suicide and self-harm, or using racist language or sexually suggestive acts. The sheer volume of content is impossible to monitor, and while TikTok does have a reporting system, users can view inappropriate content on the app.

EXPLICIT SONGS

The app allows users to create videos of users lip-synching and dancing to music. Explicit, or inappropriate, songs will probably appear in a user's feed. The app's search function allows users to search for specific songs, which may include explicit lyrics and that are deemed to include derogatory language or negative content.

TIKTOK FAME

The app has created its own celebrities. One of the most famous is Charli D'Amelio, who uploaded a video by 13 years old in 2019 and became the first person to reach 100 million followers. TikTok fame can be achieved overnight, and many young people are trying to become the next big thing on the app. This can lead to a lot of pressure to get views.

HAZARDOUS VISIBILITY

Connecting with others is one of the main reasons for using the app, and according to many users, it helps them make new friends and build their confidence. The majority of users who witness and report inappropriate content on the app are young people, with many reporting that they have experienced problems with the app's social networking features.

ADDICTIVE NATURE

TikTok's addictive nature is due to its algorithm, which is designed to keep users watching as long as possible. The app's recommendation system is designed to keep users watching, and the app's algorithm is designed to keep users watching as long as possible.

IN-APP SPENDING

There is an in-app option to purchase virtual gifts, which are then converted into digital coins that can be used to purchase virtual gifts from other users. This can lead to a lot of spending, and many young people are trying to become the next big thing on the app.

Advice for Parents & Carers

TALK ABOUT ONLINE CONTENT

Discussing your child's online activities is important. Encourage your child to talk to you about anything they see online that makes them feel uncomfortable or unsafe. Encourage your child to report any inappropriate content to the app's reporting system.

MAINTAIN PRIVACY SETTINGS

The default settings for TikTok are set to 'public', meaning that anyone can view your child's videos. Encourage your child to change their settings to 'private' so that only people they know can see their videos.

LEARN ABOUT REPORTING AND BLOCKING

With the correct privacy settings applied, TikTok is a safe place for your child. However, some users may still report inappropriate content. Encourage your child to report any inappropriate content to the app's reporting system.

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING

Family Pairing allows parents and carers to manage their child's account. This includes setting screen time limits, restricting content, and enabling Family Link.

USE RESTRICTED MODE

Restricted Mode is a feature that allows parents and carers to restrict the content that their child can see on the app. This includes restricting content based on age, language, and other factors.

MODERATE SCREEN TIME

Encourage your child to take regular breaks from the app. This includes taking breaks during school hours and encouraging your child to spend time with friends and family offline.

What your child needs to know:

Year 1 Count in multiples of 2, 5 and 10. Recall and use doubles of all numbers to 10 and corresponding halves.

A simple way to help your children with letters, words, vocabulary and spelling at home!



Exploring Letters with Scrabble Tiles



Scrabble tiles are easy to find on online shops such as Amazon.

Alternatively, why not make you own set of letter tiles using paper, card or old pieces of wood and marker pens!



Here are some great ways that you can use Scrabble tiles for learning:

- Younger children can **spell their names** on the table or on their scrabble trays
- Older children can make **sight words**, and then **swap out a letter** to form a new word
- **spell a name** with the tiles, and then **re-arrange** to see how many new words can be made from the name
- Organise the scrabble tiles **alphabetically**, searching for, and then laying out “A, B, C, D...”
- Place scrabble tiles on the table, face up, and **call out letters** for the children to find
- Place the tiles face down, and **play “memory”** by flipping over two at a time, trying to make matches
- To build motor skills, try **stacking the tiles** and building towers, or lay them out side-by-side to make **letter trains**
- **Sorting/counting** – find all the A tiles and count them up etc.
- **Make the highest scoring word** you can from a set number of tiles
- **Create the most exciting adjective / verb / adverb** using the smallest amount of tiles
- Put the tiles together into the most interesting **sentence** you can make
- **Make up your own game or challenge** with the tiles!




Standing Long Jump PE Home Learning

- Challenge a partner to see who can jump the furthest.
- If you have space, place down a marker at 8.31m, the distance Greg Rutherford jumped to win a gold medal in 2012. How many jumps does it take to jump that distance?



Can you focus on your technique and concentrate on your landing?



Work on your own to develop your technique. Each time you jump and land on two feet you score a point.



What other jumping records are there? Can you try and beat them by practising lots?



Challenge other family members to see how many jumps it takes them to equal Greg Rutherford!

British Landscape Podcast

Podcasts are a popular way for people to listen to audio content. They are a series of episodes that can be downloaded, streamed or listened to through apps. Often, people use their mobile phones so they can listen to their favourite podcasts on the go, using headphones or in the car. Recently, a podcast, which lets listeners tune in to sounds of the British landscape, has become a success. The podcast, Radio Lento, was created 18 months ago by parents, Hugh Huddy and Madeleine Sugden. Each episode lasts between 15 and 90 minutes and features the sounds of the landscape – no music or talking. Madeleine said: 'We've covered approximately 400 miles on foot in search of places to record, not the usual chocolate box places, but ones with interesting sounds, such as Spaghetti Junction and industrial

locations. For us, it is about finding and sharing beauty from everyday places.' Radio Lento will soon hit 115,000 downloads, with many people being inspired to listen to the landscape not just look!

Record Breaking Balloonist

A 28-year-old Frenchman has broken the world record for standing on top of a hot air balloon at altitude. Rémi Ouvrard stood on top of the balloon at a height of more than 3,637m (two and a quarter miles) over Chatellerault, in the west of France. The balloon was operated by Remi's father, Jean-Daniel Ouvrard. Rémi Ouvrard said that there was: 'good wind direction, good light, good speed. Perfect conditions to make this flight.' The stunt was for France's annual Telethon, which is a charity campaign raising money for research into rare neuromuscular diseases. The altitude chosen was not random, it was selected as it matches the phone number digits of the Telethon campaign, 36-37.



Hundreds Hop Onto Bike Bus

Every Friday morning in the Eixample district, Barcelona, hundreds of people travel to school together on a very special bus, the Bicibus or Bike Bus! There are three stops along the way where parents and children are welcome to join with their bikes, scooters or roller blades. The Bicibus all started when five families started cycling to school together in support of bike lanes and safer, quieter roads. Mireia Boix, a parent of a 5-year-old son, who takes the Bicibus, said: 'Bicycles are a means of transportation and if a 5-year-old can ride a bike to school it means that everyone else could. If the population uses their bikes, there will be a healthier, quieter and overall better city to live in.' The Bicibus route takes 25 minutes and travels down the busy Entença Street, where three schools are located. As it grew, it acquired its own police escort.
